Sparking Memories since 2003

- 40,000 people living with dementia served.

These stories reached over 20 million people and help to keep the issue of quality innovative care for people living with Alzheimer's disease in the public's mind.

A series of free art events for people living with Alzheimer's disease, their caregivers and the general public. The events are co-produced with New York Memory Center and includes light refreshments and the opportunity to chat with the guest artists. The highlight of each event is the creation of a new work of art by the audience and the guest artist.


Unit for the Cognitively Impaired at Fishkill Correcitional Facility

In 2014, Glazner began a monthly series of poetry and improvisational theater workshops to create and perform poetry and with the incarcerated men at Fishkill Correctional Facility. Fishkill has the only dedicated unit in the U.S. for people living with memory loss in prison.

APP International Programming

Glazner will be a featured speaker at the Celebrate Creative Ageing at the Sydney Opera House and Art Gallery of NSW in August, 2015. Glazner presented at the 5th Annual Art of Good Health and Wellbeing International Arts and Health Conference in Australia, in 2013. Glazner and project artist Michelle Otero led a workshop on using poetry with people

living with dementia at the Koran Arts and Culture Education Service International Arts Education Conference in Seoul, Korea in 2012. The APP completed a pilot project in Poland with support from the U.S. Embassy in Warsaw, in 2012. This work builds on APP's 2010 pilot project in Germany with funding from the U.S. Embassy in Berlin.
